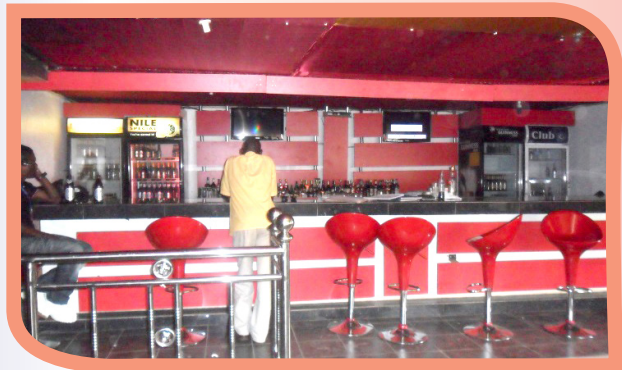

# Speech by President RC Nansana Joseph Ssuna (PHF)



## Outgoing President's message

Friends,

It seem like only Yesterday when we assumed leadership in our club. On that day I mentioned the fact that I should already be writing my hand over speech. Little did I know that time will fly so fast that indeed I will have to write this final note.

## Overview

What a year it has been! And how fast has time flown! But also what a pleasure it has been to be at the helm of serving society. We began the year with ambitious but achievable goals and I gladly say we have met most of them. We sustained our club visibility and continued to underscore RC Nansana as a huge brand. In the few paragraphs below I share the joy of service that Nansana has been and continues to be.

a). Building partnerships; this we have successfully done . As a Zone 4 active member, we have been a very active member of zone clubs in which we hosted a successful sports gala while also actively participating in events organised by other sister clubs in the zone.

b). Northern By pass Solidarity and other partnerships: We have continued building this partnership between sister clubs such as Kampala city Makerere, RC Wandegeya, Bweyogerere Namboole, Nateete, Kyengera and others. We are also partners with Centenary Bank, The town councils of Nansana, Wakiso and Kakiri, Mengo Hospital, as well as with St Stephen church Nansana. This partnership should be nurtured and strengthened for other regular partner clubs such as Bukoto, Naalya Seeta and Mukono.

C). Touching lives through service projects: In solidarity with other club Presidents we mobilised funds for a joint project that saw a 30,000 litre water tank built for at least one needy community-Makukuba. We have promoted literacy through a literacy promotion campaign in two schools (St Peters Church Primary School Kyebando and Kyebando UMEA primary school). By supplying the schools with various newspapers, we managed to cause the starting of News reading clubs in the schools. We continued supporting an orphaned blind girl and with support from RC of Wellington Australia are in the final stages of discussing support to the African Hearts project. Promoting health: Our work in health has entailed complete the supply of medical equipment to the Nurture Africa hospital worth \$37,000 as well as organising at least five Family Health days in which over 4,000 people were treated. On water and sanitation we have several projects lined up for the coming year.

These include completing Kasolo Kamponye Phase two, Water supply to 12 schools in Wakiso and Kakiri as well as a six spring Water project in Kakiri town. In collaboration with Lwamata community we took part in the Lwamata reusable sanitary towels project in which we invest \$4000 but are still positively impacting thousands of young women and girls. On youth service, we have continued providing support to our six interact and two rotaract clubs involved in a range of activities in and around their schools and communities: Our signature youth service project this year has been our Vijana Poa work a challenge thrown to us by our DG to get Youths into work. R Nansana enabled over 20 youths to access Vijana Poa training and subsequently be gainfully occupied in enterprises that include Music, dance and drama, making chalk, making soap and making crafts. We have also finalised discussions, in collaboration with opportunity Bank, through which another 20-30 entrepreneurial youths will access investment loans. We have been able to do all the above because of a strong commitment to build a strong club brand. Our Family of Rotary mini visits initiative has been a major basis of club bonding. This has been linked to our Friend of the year moment where we celebrate friendship as well as our rotary for family event in which we gave our children an opportunity to share the fun of rotary at a Rotarian's children retreat/camp. Other initiatives that make our club shine include concern and care for one another, Investment club championed by some members of the club: Fun filled Fellowships often climaxed into the famous after fellowship KIMEEZA. Consequently we have grown a committed membership. We committed to mother the new RC of Kawempe and are making steady progress towards that objective. We also made key TRF commitments most of which we have met:

Our greatest challenge has been the loss of members and our inability to win them back. There is need to develop a concept to guide development of the club land.

On the whole I hand over to my dear friend and brother Jotham a vibrant and robust a club capable of even greater things in the future.

It has been a year of great learning and service in which I and my family have been immensely honoured to be President and at the helm of such a dynamic and versatile club. I commend all the directors and general membership for the being great gifts to the world and continue trusting that together we can build hope in all the situations that our people face.

Let us now enter the new year with even greater resolve and to support all the initiatives that the year has in store for us.

Greetings Fellow Rotarians of D9211 as we look forward to a new Rotary year.



Rotary International President (2016-17) John Germ's theme Rotary Serving Humanity gets back to the basics of Rotary. He said in his address to the incoming Governors that we all have been given a great opportunity – the opportunity to go and serve our communities and to make them better. And that is the basis of being a Rotarian – to Serve above Self.

The 2016-17 Rotary year is also a very special year for us – we will be celebrating the Centennial of the formation of The Rotary Foundation. The then president of

RI, Arch Klumph, came up with an idea of starting an endowment to do good in the world. From that \$26.50 starting donation from a club, our foundation has now grown to just under \$1 Billion.

And, therefore, our main focus in the coming year will be on the Foundation. We will support the Foundation not just by giving but by utilizing it as well in the form of Grants. On the giving side, we will look not only at increasing our regular giving but also other ways like promoting the Bequest Society, Paul Harris Society, etc. We also need to make sure that every single

Rotarian in our district contributes something – even if it is \$5 – to the Foundation. At present, 44% of Rotarians in our district have not contributed at all to the Foundation.

Therefore, our first focus will be the Foundation for the coming year. But to enable us to do this, we will need to look at our Membership – both in terms of new recruitment as well as, and even more so, retention. Over the past few years, we have lost nearly 70% of those we had recruited within 2 years. We need to ask ourselves – why are we losing these members? Is it because we did not target the right people or is it because we are not giving them value for their time and money?

So to support our Foundation, we need to retain our members as well as recruit new ones to grow. In order to do this, we need to build our Brand of Rotary. We need to make Rotary visible and well known in our communities. Too often we do great work in our communities and then keep quiet about it. We need to showcase our achievements and make them widely known. Rotary should become a brand that would make people want to aspire to be associated with.

Therefore, as we build our Brand of Rotary, we will retain and attract new members and this will enable us to support our Foundation better. I congratulate you all in assuming your offices for the year and look forward to working with you all in the coming year to serve humanity.

# The Silent Issues In Rotary Leadership Transition

Every rotary year end- in the month of June- Rotary leaders will usually change leaders to fellow club members. These changes happen to all level of the organization from a Rotary club, District and final Rotary international.

Rotary international being mainly of volunteers, this is when people move from one level of service responsibility to a higher one. Unlike in other organizations and/or institutions, this change in leadership does not qualify for a promotion but rather a leadership transition. The new rotary leaders will therefore form a team with the old leaders to build vibrant clubs and District.

This Rotary Leadership transitions is thus designed to prepare Rotarians to take on new management and leadership roles and responsibilities. All members attend seminars and workshops, District assemblies and Rotary international conventions as a channel for not only training and equipping leadership skills but also to motivate leaders for service.

To the new leaders, Many changes occur that sometimes other members may not recognize and or appreciate. These might range from time commitments, priorities, relationships and networks, and the tasks you have to deal with. How successfully the leaders adjust to these changes and deference's will determine how well they and others handle the transition. You as a leader (on the balcony) will set the music and make sure that it matches the rhythm of the people on the dancing floor, and the beat of the music are all in harmony with one another. Being at the balcony a leader should be able to develop -

- Time horizon or time frame for which you need

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To be successful in this new role, you now have to pay attention to and value the success of others, and put it ahead of your own.

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to plan and achieve results

- Priorities for your attention
- Types of relationships that you need to cultivate and manage
- Tasks or core responsibilities,
- Leading and managing skills and practices that will support high performance.

The silent issue is that some of this might require some of your resources, energies and funds to cement and your members will just expect results. Thus, as a club President, director or committee chair at this Leadership transition, not only do you have to learn a new set of skills, but you also have to pay attention to new priorities, cultivate new relationships, and practice new behaviors that will reflect that your work now includes the work of all club members.

You will notice that before the transition, you were responsible only for your own timeliness, Now you are responsible for the accomplishments of your club/ Committee tasks , and may require you to develop plans to make sure your team is prepared. You have to anticipate things you never had to think about before. Your time horizon will be shifted from a day or a week to several months or maybe even a year. You now get new priorities and new networks that will make you achieve. All these are just silent issues that may not be told while assuming leadership. To be successful in this new role, you now have to pay attention to and value the success of others, and put it ahead of your own. This is why I consider changes in Rotary leadership not to be a "promotion" to jubilate but a necessary "leadership transition" in Rotary.

## Blind girl receives 'sights' a ray of hope

It was in the year 2011 when the Rotary Club of Nansana was approached by a concerned citizen to seek possibility of supporting one blind girl who was not only blind but in pain that required immediate surgery. The girl's hope was that if the persistent pain could be taken away from her and some good Samaritan could support her education needs, then she would have a hope for the future. The matter was presented to the Board of the Rotary Club of Nansana which agreed to support the girl child. I remember one fellowship when she was brought to 'face' Rotarians and talk about her plight. Through the support and acquaintance amongst Rotarians, within a period of two weeks from the Board's approval, the girl had had a successful operation of her eyes and the pain was no more. It did not matter to her that she was still blind, she felt that without pain she could 'see' a ray of hope. Her following visit to the Club is vividly remembered for filling the fellowship with a feeling of goodness and great reason for one to be in the Rotary family. The Rotary Club of Nansana, pleased with their patient's quick recovery, went ahead to plan



for supporting the education and subsistence needs of the girl. She was admitted to Namasagali College for her A level and during the course of each term, the Rotarians would kindly and willingly contribute towards her school needs. Three years down the road, is a proud girl who passed her A level exams well. She later joined Makerere University on Government sponsorship to pursue a bachelor's degree in Community Psychology. This is now her second year.

## Dear Family of Rotary,

At the beginning of the year, we set out to serve our communities diligently by BEING GIFTS TO THE WORLD. As Assistant Governor I encouraged all the Zone 4 Presidents Margaret, Mebra, Joseph, Frederick, Abdullah, and Richard in the following words, “You will realize that over time our arms have grown longer because of serving. Yet, millions around us can still not be fed, clothed or housed. Our environment is quickly turning browner, our cultures getting more decayed, our children not getting quality education, our women dying in labor, malaria and other communicable disease prevalence is on increase, name it. At the end, we will not be judged by how many great things we have done, or how much money we have received or made, but we will be judged by ...“I was hungry and you gave me something to eat. I was naked and you clothed me, I was homeless and you took me in” –We have now come to the end of the Rotary year and this is the time to reflect on these words. Did we live up to the expectations of what we promised to do?

# Ms Rwanda Bonds With Rotaractors During Umuganda Rwanda

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Rwanda, the land of 100 hills is renowned for its beautiful and clean capital city Kigali. However, socially, one of its most appreciated qualities by most east Africans is its beautiful citizens most especially Miss Rwanda. Little wonder that when our hosts the Rotaract Clubs of Kigali City and KIE confirmed that Miss Rwanda, Jolly Mutesi, would grace #REACT2016, the 35 Rotaract clubs from the region that had registered for the trip were filled with excitement.

The 70 Rotaractors from Uganda who travelled to Kigali-Rwanda, are part of an initiative called Rotaract East Africa Impact also dubbed REACT. It was formed to unite youth from diverse backgrounds and empower them to better serve their communities nationally and internationally.

#REACT2016 themed, "Nutrition and household welfare", attracted other rotary youths and guests from Kenya, Tanzania and Burundi for this regional annual project.

The project site was Gasharu village, KINYINYA sector, Gasabo District, a home to elderly people, teen mothers and HIV positive orphans who were relocated after the unfortunate 1994 genocide.

The project took place on UMUGANDA (General Cleaning Day) one of Rwanda's most respected and long standing traditions. We worked in partnership with Peace and Hope Initiative, a local NGO that has been supporting community building initiatives in this village since 2005. Our chief guest, Miss Rwanda 2016, Jolly Mutesi, excited the participants and beneficiaries with her charm, kind personality and active participation in the project activities.

The key project activity for the day was the setting up of 50 kitchen gardens by the 138 rotaractors that were divided into 16 groups. Each group was given tools, a community elder and a rotaractor from Rwanda to guide them as they setup and planted seeds (Garbage, Beetroot, Spinach and Carrot) in the kitchen gardens. Kitchen garden(s) are a program that was introduced by the government to tackle nutrition and food insecurity but was eventually adopted by and taken over by the communities. Miss Rwanda, Jolly Mutesi, visited many of the sites offering refreshments and snacks to the hardworking rotaractors. She also interacted with them, took pictures with them and more importantly participated in some tasks like chopping wood for fencing the kitchen garden, filling soil and lastly planting of seeds. She later presided over the handing over of donations that is food, clothes and nutrition literacy material to Peace and Hope initiative.

# Youths should Tap Potential of Agriculture Sector

For a long time, human beings have used honey not only as food, but also for wound care and cough treatment. It is an organic, natural sugar alternative with no additives that is easy on the stomach, with good source of different essential compounds for the human body.

Experts have found it has different medical advantages including body weight regulation, relieving annoying coughs which are more common in TB patients among others. While unemployment is high among the youth, beekeeping and the entire Honey value chain in Uganda is dominated by older people who consider it as a side business, attaching a low economic value to it hence the subsistence production

The good side is that there is untapped market as well as increasing private sector investment and access to technical skills. Eventually, we believe it will be a priority sector for the government. We would like a situation where beekeeping can offer a solution to the high youth unemployment in Uganda.

But how is this possible? Youths should form groups to market hive products and take advantage of the available structures because the long-term observation is that the industry is getting organized.

Last year the Uganda National Apiculture Development Organisation (Tunado), organized a youth forum focused on commercialising beekeeping for youth and women enterprises. Highlighting how best the apiculture industry can be improved and exploited by the above groups.

This kicked Village Link Africa in the direction to start on the *Apiculture for Livelihood Improvement Project* where we not only deal in the sale of Honey and other Hive products but also offering trainings and bee consultancy to our clients.

Village Link Africa now offers to its growing clientele a variety of honeys ranging from Light Honey, Single flower Honey / Mono floral Honey, multi floral among others. This honey has lots of medicinal values. It is harvested from cattle corridor areas of the Pearl of Africa.

## Collective marketing

During the forum it was agreed the Bee keeping Sector and the entire Honey value chain could potentially be among the richest industries in the country but the practitioners are the poorest.

This is simply because they do not want to work in groups. It requires little capital to start a beekeeping venture but it needs collective marketing of the products.

“While it is important to discuss the harvest and post-harvest handling of honey and other bee products, we must focus on the business side. We are saying get practical do not just give it lip service, form groups and you will be supported. You should be business-oriented,” said Dickson Biryomumaisho TUNADO Executive director.

Before we even talk about exporting, realise that we have to do a lot for the internal market by increasing volumes. Individually, you can never be able to raise enough to satisfy the available market but as a group you can do better in this industry.

## Hindrances

However, there are a number of the factors hindering young people from participating in the honey sector despite their lack of employment.

These include the following: The limited access to information on beekeeping, lack of role models to stimulate inspiration among the youths, bureaucracy involved in honey and other bee products marketing especially in the export marketing, and the absence of a policy on beekeeping.

We need more extension staff plus consistent research information on beekeeping. The challenge is that there is no clear statistics about the industry. The government has not yet made beekeeping a priority sector but, *that does not stop young people from getting organised and involved in the lucrative industry. A policy is just a paper that with or without it people should continue earning from the trade of honey and other hive products.*

Honestly, Honey talk can never end but remember to take a spoon of honey everyday as King Solomon ordered “My son, eat honey because it is good, And the honeycomb which is sweet to your taste.” Prov 24:13

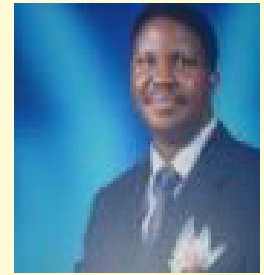

The club holds **Interesting and exciting fellowships** always led by the Buddy group of month. A silent competition exists among buddy groups with each trying to outdo the other and climaxing all in the monthly club day where celebrations and anniversaries are celebrated.

The club has a **strong commitment to youth service** and supports 4 interact and four rotaract clubs. Youth service has gone a notch higher with the introduction of

the vijaana Poa programme. The club has and continues to build **relationship with strategic partners** among are Nansana Town council, Centenary Bank, Wakiso District Local government, Mengo Hospital, Stephen church and Nakule Health Centre

**The proceeding sections provides a quick snapshot under each of the six directorates**

## Club Administration

The club is active and vibrant and members are broadly engaged in achieving a robust and effective club. The club has a defined brand and each member carries the responsibility of maintaining the brand, buddy groups have kept all members active and engaged with each. Buddy group leading for a month. More than 10 members have sponsored new members. To-date six people are serving above the club level including former Super AG, Incoming Vice Country Chair, DCA representative, and members on Mengo blood bank. There has been an increase in the number of members attending DCA over the years, from 3 in 2010 to 30 members in 2016 attending DCA. Over the years the club has continued to get unqualified audit financial reports on an annual basis by external auditors. The club has continued to meet RI obligations and has been qualified for all the years.



## Membership

Membership has grown from 20 to 46 members and the retention rate stands at 90%. The Club has continued to identify, orient, recruit and retain members through effective fellowship and family of rotary innovative approaches. The club introduced the Red budge programme where newly invited members are placed under mentorship for a period of six months before they can be inducted. More than 10 members from the club have benefited from RLI trainings. Other initiatives for members engagement include home visits, family outings and mini-visits.



## Public Relations

The Club has established the use of social media in addition to monthly Lubigi bulletin such as, whatsapp, email and website to communicate and mobilise members for participation in key activities and sharing with the outside world.



Over the last eight years the Rotary Club of Nansana has partnered with Centenary Bank Nansana Town Council and other partner to undertake annual cleaning of Nansana town in a move doubled as Keep the Town Clean. This has enabled the community to engage in appreciating what Rotary does and hence their participation. Relatedly Centenary Bank has provided dustbins that have been placed at key strategic locations for use by community.

## Service Directorate

Over the years the Club has implemented a number of projects including a) installation of water tanks in Mukono Nkonkonjeru b) water harvest at Entebbe c) renovation of Wakiso Health Centre IV maternity ward, installation of water supply system, construction of the patient shade d) Nsawo Adopt Model II ) retooling of Nurture Africa Community Health centre

**The Rotary Club of Nansana received a matching Grant Number 72256 of \$24,461 from District 1250 to promote water harvest in Nkokonjeru, Mukono district.**

## RENOVATION OF A MATERNITY WARD AT WAKISO DISTRICT HEALTH CENTRE IV

The RC Nansana in partnership with Wakiso Town Council renovated the Wakiso Health Centre IV maternity ward, the funding was completed with Rotary District 9200 Development Funds. The support included medical equipments ( Patient trolley, Drip Stand, Waiting benches and the Examination Bed with back rest), internal and external maintenance and repairs of the ward, water harvesting and water tank and construction of patient's walking shade.



## Nsawo Adopt Model II

This was a \$46,680 collaborative project between the Rotary Club of Clayton Valley/Concord Sunrise and Rotary Club of Nansana to transform the livelihoods of the people in Nsawo community through a comprehensive development intervention led by Rotary dubbed NSawo Adopt A village model project

The Nsawo Adopt A village Phase II was a follow-up project after a successful completion of Phase one. Adopt a village project is to transform the livelihoods of the people in this community through a comprehensive development intervention. These interventions include provision income generating projects, vocational training skills, Improve maternal and child healthcare, and Provide safe clean water. In total the following were provided: 2000 banana suckers, 18 piglets and 2 boar; pig feeds; construction of a bore hole; supply of 10 sheep; saucepans: 10 wooden serving tables; s300pcs Mama Kits; supply of 500 plates & 20 food warmers; 3 big Tents; 100 seater and 500 plastic chairs; 10 sewing machines; supply of a brick making machines.

The vocational skills and the income generating activities have increased the community's ability to generate money, which is making them less vulnerable and now able to solve their financial needs. The community has also gaining greater visibility in the surrounding area as it offers its services. The youth and particularly the girls

have gained a sense of pride and confidence from the skills acquired. Safe and readily available water has the sinking of the borehole, has improved on the access of safe water to the community members and the school. This has reduced on the frequency of morbidity for both the school going children and the community members on time lost walking long distances to fetch water, thus time can be used for other productivity ventures. Certainly access to clean water is impacting directly on hygiene and health though we have not quantified this yet.

Through the distribution of mama kits, there has been improvement in deliveries, and less strain on health centres. Overall, there is improved health, and incomes. The provision of catering equipment's have enabled the group to increase their incomes through provision of catering services for functions in the community, as the catering groups continues to be invited to provide the services on functions.



## Nurture Africa

This was a US\$32,276 collaborative project between the ROTARY CLUB FINGAL in Dublin and Rotary Club of Nansana to retool Nurture Africa Community Health Centre in Nansana to enable it provide anti-retroviral treatment to HIV affected children and their guardians, preventative and primary health care to 15,000 of the most vulnerable children with dangerous diseases such as malaria, pneumonia and diarrhea. The equipment included theatre tables, Biosafety Cabinet, resting Beds with mattresses, and hot Air Oven. An annual medical outreaches have been undertaken reaching about 500 people per year with prevention and medical treatment services.



**Education:** RC Nansana is supporting schools to improve literacy through provision of cheap reading materials such as newspapers so far 2 schools have benefited from these news papers and other reading materials donated by club members. In collaboration with a partner from Australia the club has finalized a proposal worthy USD 100,000 for Africa Caring Hearts.

In collaboration with Lwamata health facility in Kiboga district the club started a girl child education support project. We received USD 4,000 for provision of sanitary pads.

**Water and sanitation:** The club mobilised fund at club level to provide clean and safe water to the community. The community around Kasoloka Mponye were the beneficiaries. The club has already embarked on the second phase of the project, which is to increase the amount of clean & safe water to be provided to the community by adding on two more water outlet points. The site has been visited and the community has been mobilised and given their counter funding in collaboration with Centenary bank we have provided five garbage bins to different locations in Nansana, Wakiso and Kakiri town councils. This is part of our effort to keep our towns clean initiative.



## Youth Service

The Club has sponsored seven interact clubs namely Makerere SSS, Kasubi SS, Mount of Olives, St Charles Lwanga SSS, City Secondary School Senge , Kakiri Secondary School and three Rotaract clubs of Mulltitech Business School and Rotarat Nansana and sponsored a number of youth to attend RYLA on an annual basis.

**Interact clubs:** Mount of Olives College Kakiri – Adapt a school project (Springs Alive Community School), St. Charles Lwanga – Cleaning of school compound, City Secondary Senge – Tree planting in the school, Makerere Senior Secondary School – Road repair project in their neighborhood., Kakiri Senior Secondary School – Provided Bucket for proper disposal of sanitary towels, provide drinking water to the whole school and Collect scholastic materials from students and give to disadvantaged students in the school. And Kasubi Secondary School.

**Rotaract clubs Projects:** Multitech Business school – Muyambe project that assists well performing disadvantaged students of the Institute, Rotaract Nansana – Temanakali Sanitation project and joint project with the Interact club of MOCK and mother club and Due to co-sponsor a Rotaract club together with the Rotary club of Kampala Wandegeya and this is in its early days.

Vijana Poa; In collaboration with Nansana town council Vijana Poa youth projects under each enterprise are to be registered as a Community Based Organizations. This is envisaged to ease their access to financial services and support from other partners. Seven youth were sponsored to attend entrepreneurship training in August 10 youth have been formed a drama club and have started performing at different functions and are earning a living. They charge between 300,000/= to 1m per performance depending on the nature of the function and location. Two rotaractors from the Rotaract club of Nansana have started a chalk production project. Two youth have started a crafts Project RC Nansana is working together with the Inter Cottage Co-operative Society of Uganda Mr. Kayibanda of C.B.S and Uganda National Bureau of Standards that has seen 8 youth start enterprises in making of Candles, Fruit Juice, Shampoo and Liquid Soap.

**Agricultural Projects:** 10 youth are to use the Club Land to have nursery beds for Passion fruits and coffee. Have a global grant in the pipeline to support our Agricultural project under Economic Empowerment and Community development area of focus. Bee keeping project led by Rotaractor Brian Senoga that is to see at least 15 youth start their own enterprises.

The Club has 10 PHFs and one PHF +1.

The club has continued to recognize and reward the best polio plus contributors with a lapel badge each fellowship.

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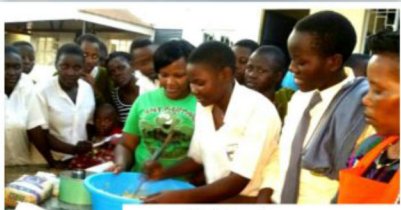
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# ROTARY IS NOT FOR THE RICH DRUNKARDS,
